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Letter from the President

Dear Friends,

It is with a deep appreciation for the good efforts of the Dominican College Community that I present this 2012–13 Annual Report. The people who are members of this community are the College's greatest asset. They are competent, collaborative and compassionate—committed to the growth and success of both students and colleagues—always desirous of making a positive difference.

Dominic Guzmán, a Spanish friar of the thirteen century, founded the Order which would bear his name. Committed to the search for and the transmission of truth, he believed in the value of a nurturing community, based on deep respect for the individual and concern for the whole. Dominic was a joyful person, a man of great personal freedom. His compassionate nature led him to respond to the needs of others. He appreciated the value of prayer and study in helping people realize their potential.

It was in this tradition of community, prayer, study and service that Sr. Mary Ann Sammon was formed. In 1878, one hundred

thirty-five years ago, she left Holy Rosary Convent in Manhattan to establish a home for orphans in Blauveltville. The safety and growth of these children was most important to her. In a short period of time, she constructed St. Joseph's Home, a chapel and a school to meet their needs. This past September, the life and spirit of this generous, wise and compassionate woman, was the focus of the College's Founders Week.

The College, in the spirit of Dominic Guzman and Mary Ann Sammon, continues to share in the Blauvelt Dominican tradition—seeking truth, experiencing community and developing an ever stronger commitment to the development of leadership and service in an environment committed to excellence. Dominican strives to be a place of welcome where differences are integrated and individuals respected.

2012–2013 was a challenging but good year for the College. Close to 2,100 students were served, from 24 states and 24 countries, with

51% of the traditional full-time students living on campus. A second five year lease was signed with St. Catharine's, providing needed office and instructional space.

The Annual Fund increased the level of support and the Comprehensive Campaign realized 80% of its \$12 million goal with one and a half years to go. The fiscal year ended with a surplus of over \$800,000 and a small but growing endowment of close to \$4 million.

In the late fall, the College received word from Middle States that its Periodic Review had been accepted with commendation, a recognition received by only 1/3 of the institutions then under review by Middle States. The College's approach to strategic planning and the assessment of institutional effectiveness was commended.

A Center for Adult Student Education (CASE) was created to continue the years of good work





provided by the ACCEL and Weekend delivery systems but now accomplished through an online format to meet the needs of non-traditional students. Efforts to encourage internships for all eligible students continue.

The College's women's sports program received the Restano Cup for the third year in a row for highest achievement among the fourteen colleges of CACC. For the second year in a row the men's program was ranked second. Overall, the College's Athletic program has been recognized as among the best in the conference for the last three years.

College Policies and Procedures were updated and a new Strategic Plan completed. The College continued its commitment to being a sustainable campus, developing a guide to move the campus in that direction over the next few years.

In May the largest class, 551 students, were graduated and encouraged by the words of the Commencement Speaker, Commissioner Ray Kelly. The College's Alumni now total over 11,500.

Faithful to its traditions and encouraged by the achievements of this past year, Dominican continues to engage in creative and forward-looking planning so that the aspirations of the people it is privileged to serve will be met and surpassed.

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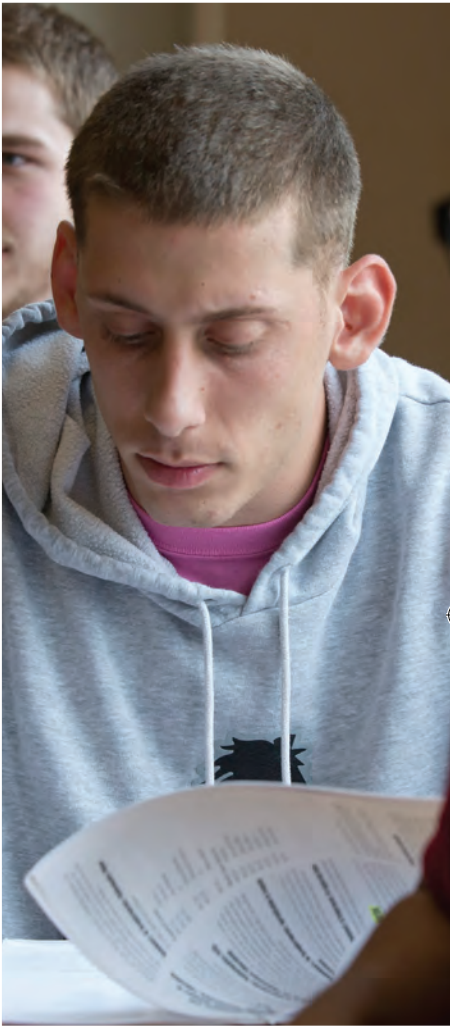

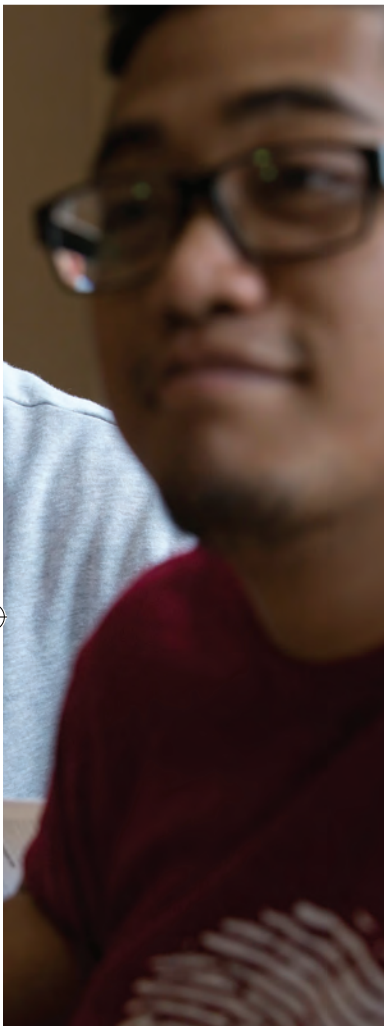

Dominican College Announces Four New Online Offerings

This year the College expanded its degree offerings by converting the on-campus ACCEL program to an entirely online format. As of May 2013, four Dominican College degree programs are available online.

Dr. Joanne Clemente, codirector of the new online programs said, "Dominican College is extremely proud of its nascent online program. We've started with Business Administration, Management, Communication Studies and Social Sciences, and will soon move forward with the development of additional programs. It is an exciting time for us. Students are quickly adapting to the new venue, as faculty, staff, and administrators are 'all in' when it comes to support."

The online Bachelor of Science in Business Administration curriculum focuses on the multiple principles behind business administration and gives professionals a firm foundation of core business concepts to make better decisions that maximize a business's productivity and efficiency.

Communication opens the doors to effective business strategies. The online Bachelor of Arts in Communication Studies

program prepares a new workforce of effective communicators, ethical leaders, and innovative media practitioners.

The online Bachelor of Science in Management curriculum focuses on current business management theories and applications, and will assist students to become business leaders who can easily adapt to the demands of a changing work environment in the 21st century.

The online Bachelor of Arts in Social Sciences examines the global community with a strong focus on the study of the total human experience from an individual, social, historical, institutional, and environmental perspective.

Courses are designed to develop a well-rounded communication professional who is prepared to manage a changing and advanced media.

All classes are held online and students can study at their convenience. Like all of the College's degree programs, the new online programs are registered by the New York State Education Department and are accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Codirector Kathy O'Connell reported that Criminal Justice and Psychology will be available online during the 2014 academic year.

Alternate Spring Break Helps Those in Need

Over the past several years, Dominican College students spent their spring breaks helping to rebuild homes devastated by Hurricane Katrina. This past year, students and staff volunteered at three different locations to help others in Baltimore, MD, Tuscaloosa, AL, and Toms River, NJ, where they provided greatly needed services to communities in need through Habitat for Humanity.

The Baltimore team worked in an area of boarded up and abandoned row homes where many of the houses were foreclosed and put up for auction. They assisted a homeowner with her own catering business who also plans to use her house for a work space.

According to recent graduate Frandy Osias-Louis, '13, "The Alternative Spring Break program is not only an opportunity to give a helping hand, but it is a chance to be a part of something greater than you. Our experiences shape us, but who we become shapes everyone around us."

A second team visited Tuscaloosa, Alabama, where they worked on several homes that were destroyed by tornadoes in April 2011.

Elsa Sanchez, '13, said, "I was blessed to help those who needed a hand, but I am even more blessed for having learned such valuable lessons from those very people. Despite their current situations, they always carried a bright smile and the will to move forward. Thanks to Alternative Spring Break, I found my passion for service and I look forward to continue doing God's work in the future!"

The third team worked in Toms River, New Jersey on several projects including clean-up, fundraising, and organizing donations set up by "Rebuild Our Shore" after Hurricane Sandy last November.

Arlene Phayre, '15, explained her volunteer work this way: "I believe we all walked away with a great sense of fulfillment and felt our efforts made a difference, if even in the smallest way. It is difficult for me to put into words all that went through my mind and heart as we saw the devastation on the Jersey Shore. My home away from home has most certainly been transformed and my hope is that in the rebuild



we are able to maintain a bit of the nostalgia that so made the Jersey Shore, ‘The Shore’. This will take a lot of courage, resilience, and hard work.”

Alternative Spring Break is a long-term program that prepares students for a week-long immersion experience with Habitat for Humanity in impoverished areas. Students work in places affected by natural disasters and places that are steeped in a cycle of poverty. Students are selected for one of several trips, based upon their preference and experience. The College subsidizes the cost of each student’s travel, but there is an individual fee that students can fundraise to offset.

New York Police Commissioner Ray Kelly Speaks at Commencement

On May 19, 2013, over 500 graduates along with their families and friends packed the Westchester County Center for Dominican College’s 59th Commencement Ceremony.

New York City Police Commissioner Raymond W. Kelly delivered the Commencement address. He told students they all have a special role to play in

life. He said, “But only when we recognize that we are bigger than ourselves can we see the whole future. No doubt the Dominican Sisters felt that way when they established the school. I’m

guessing you felt it too when you arrived on campus from places near and far. You brought your individual talents and your personal hopes and dreams.”

Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg appointed Kelly Police Commissioner of New York City in January 2002. This appointment is actually the second time Commissioner Kelly has served in the role. The first was under Mayor David N. Dinkins from 1992–1994.

A 43-year veteran of the NYPD, Commissioner Kelly served in 25 different commands before being named Police Commissioner. He holds a B.B.A. from Manhattan College, a J.D. from St. John’s University School of Law, a LL.M. from New York University Graduate School of Law and an M.P.A. from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. In September 2006, Commissioner Kelly was awarded France’s highest decoration, the Legion D’Honneur, by then French Minister of the Interior Nicholas Sarkozy. Commissioner Kelly retired as a Colonel from the Marine Corps Reserves after 30 years of service.

Kelly also took note of the Class of 2013’s service experiences to help those in need. He said, “You upheld a deep and time-honored tradition passed down to generations of students by the founding Dominican Sisters of compassionate involvement and service to others. This was evident in numerous acts of charity carried out by students over the past four years.”

In closing, Commissioner Kelly told students to be idealists. He concluded his speech reminding students that they have already shown the ability to rise to any challenge.

The College awarded honorary

degrees to Commissioner Kelly and Dr. Joan H. Facelle, former Health Commissioner for Rockland County. The Veritas Medal was awarded posthumously to Fr. Ronald A. Stanley, O.P. Matthew L. Robertson was recognized with the Badami Outstanding Alumnus Award.

Creating a Sustainable Campus Community

As America’s economy transforms itself into a green economy, the College has taken strides to limit the environmental impact of the campus community. In 2009, a campus-wide Sustainability Committee was founded including administrators, faculty, staff, students, and the recently organized student-led Earth Club.

This year, a subgroup of the committee, the Sustainability Task Force, produced a five-year strategic plan incorporating campus systems, earth systems, administrative systems, and education and engagement. Their plan includes the following initiatives and areas of concern:

The Prusmack Center: The Prusmack Center for Health and Science, which opened in 2005, initiated the College’s focused efforts on developing and maintaining a sustainable campus. The Center features a geothermal system, a dry swale corridor to provide storm water management, automatic lighting sensors, and laboratory equipment designed to use energy and water sources efficiently. In furnishing the Center, the College utilized high grade recycled laboratory furnishings as well as donated equipment.

Food Services: The Food Services operations at the College utilize biodegradable Styrofoam free products.

Reusable mugs and sports bottles are offered for sale, with a discount offered on purchased drinks for their use. New York State products are used whenever possible, not only for their quality but to reduce the impact on the environment involved in shipment. Local “Farmers Market Days” are hosted on site. In addition, a strict delivery schedule is in place to maximize delivery capacity and reduce unnecessary trips for small deliveries.

Recycling: Recycling efforts on campus increase each year. Receptacles are placed strategically throughout campus to allow for easy separation of trash, paper, cans, and bottles. Campus Facilities department also

offers collection of batteries, electronic devices, and ink cartridges. Digital signage provides reminders, updates, student-created slogans, and other prompts to encourage a wide-range of recycling efforts. In addition, a recycling “fair” is held annually, as students move out of residence halls, facilitating the reuse of items either by other students or for distribution of such items by local charities.

Upgrades and New Construction:

All upgrades and new construction have been determined with a keen eye on sustainability. The College installed energy star-rated boilers and other equipment as well as motion sensors for lighting where appropriate. All campus construction projects specify that environmentally-rated building materials and coatings as well as specific high E-grade windows, R-value insulation products, low VOC paints, and carpet tiles are required. In addition, LED lighting upgrades have been made in outdoor and interior settings and a schedule for such installations will continue to be pursued. Low flow plumbing fixtures have also been installed in administrative buildings and are scheduled for installation in other facilities.

Earth Week: Earth Week is celebrated on campus annually to offer a variety of activities focused on environmental issues, to recognize the efforts of those who have contributed to environmental awareness and sustainability on campus, and to engage campus constituencies in community “clean up” activities both on campus and in conjunction with local groups.

“The College recognize that sustainability goes hand in hand with a just, equitable, and prosperous society, and we work hard not only to green our campus practices but also to teach students through academic courses and campus life that creating a sustainable society is a responsibility that falls to each of us,” said Sr. Mary Eileen O’Brien, O.P.



Community Engagement and Leadership Development Program Initiated

Christine Dilts, formerly an Assistant Director of Residence Life, has been promoted to Director of Community Engagement and Leadership Development. In her new role she will be encouraging students to become involved in shared pursuits of social justice and charity. Through the exploration of civic needs and compassionate responses, students will learn leadership skills and become dedicated to social action.

Some of the program’s community services initiative include: Outreach to the children of migrant farm workers, home construction for low income families, visiting and assisting homebound Sisters, and volunteering at food pantries.

One of the program’s signature activities is Alternative Spring Break (ASB). During the week of spring break, when other students are vacationing, ASB students perform a week-long immersion with Habitat for Humanity in an impoverished area. Previously, the ASB program has constructed homes in Tuscaloosa Alabama, partnered with Rebuild Our Shore in Toms River, New Jersey and explored poverty and effective responses in Baltimore, Maryland.



The Annual Grand Reception

The College's 41st annual Grand Reception was held on Sunday, April 28, at Three Sixty° in NYC. The event celebrated Tilcon New York Inc., for the company's outstanding professional leadership, philanthropic community involvement, and high ethical standards.

Women Win Third Straight Restaino Cup

For the third year in a row, the Dominican College women have won the Alfred R. Restaino, Sr. Cup, an award given annually to the most successful athletic programs in the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC).

Cups are awarded annually to CACC men's and women's athletic programs that perform the best across the board in conference competition. The point system used for the award takes into account each athletic program's finish in both the CACC 2012-2013 regular season and conference tournaments. Each school receives a combined point total, which is divided by the number of sports the institution sponsors.

The Dominican College women were awarded the cup on the strength of their performances in volleyball, softball, and basketball. The Chargers claimed the regular season and tournament championship in volleyball, the regular season championship in softball, and a second place regular season finish in basketball.

Men Place Second:

The Dominican College men placed second in Cup scoring behind Wilmington College. The men were led by the basketball squad, which claimed the CACC North Division championship while earning the pro-

gram's first NCAA East Region Tournament berth. The men's soccer team contributed by winning the tournament championship after finishing second in the regular season.

Joseph Clinton Wins Coach of the Year

Men's basketball coach, **Joseph Clinton**, was named the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC) Coach of the Year. His peers selected him after guiding the Chargers to a North Division title and 21-5 overall mark.

Clinton led his team to multiple appearances in the NABC Top 25 Coaches Poll this season, and finished the regular season ranked twenty-third. This is the fourth time Coach Clinton has received CACC Coach of the Year honors. He previously won in 1995-1996, 1999-2000, and 2000-2001. He has a career coaching record of 329-316 and a CACC coaching record of 210-156.

Men's Basketball Earns First-Ever NCAA Tournament Appearance

The Dominican College men's basketball team earned the program's first appearance in the NCAA East Regional Tournament. The Chargers earned the fifth seed in the East

Regional, but ultimately fell to fourth seeded University of New Haven by a score of 73-66 in the first round game.

A Historic Year for Women's Volleyball

The women's volleyball team made program history as they went undefeated in conference play, won their first Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference (CACC) regular season and tournament championships, and earned the program's first appearance in the NCAA East Regional Tournament. They finished the season with an overall record of 26-8 and a perfect CACC record of 19-0.

The Lady Chargers were the top overall seed in the CACC tournament, and the top seed from the North Division. Dominican College went 3-0 in the CACC Tournament, after topping the University of the Sciences, Philadelphia University, and Wilmington University. The CACC Conference title earned them an automatic bid to the NCAA East Regional Tournament where they fell to the top-seeded University of New Haven.

Head Coach Stefanie Carrington, in her fifth season at the helm of the Lady Chargers, was named the CACC Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

This past year, Dominican College hosted a variety of special events centered on academic or cultural interests that were open to the campus community as well as to the broader local community.

SPECIAL EVENTS BRING

The Dominican College Community Together

April 27, 2013: The Tri Beta NE-1 Regional Conference included a keynote address entitled “Merging Drug Discovery and Innovation: A Dream or Reality?” that was delivered by Dr. Tarek Mansour. The Conference also featured nearly 40 poster and platform presentations from students representing Dominican College as well as 11 other institutions from across four states.

September 10, 2013: The first in the annual President’s Lecture Series was entitled “The Day the Sky Went Dark” delivered by Ben Sliney, the F.A.A. National Operations Manager. On September 11, 2001 he, made the unprecedented decision to ground over 4,000 airplanes.

November 13, 2013: The Division of Social Sciences hosted the Sister Michelle Nugent Lecture. Dr. Vincent Prohaska presented the lecture entitled “Succeeding in College.”

January 11, 2013: James Orr, Vice President and Dick Peach, Senior Vice President, from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, led a discussion that provided both national and regional perspectives on the economy.

March 18, 2013: Dominican College alumnus Anthony De Jesus, '89, was the keynote speaker at Social Work Community Day. Dr. De Jesus is Assistant Professor at the Silberman School of Social Work at Hunter College (CUNY). Dr. De

Jesus spoke about his rich experience as a social work practitioner, administrator, and researcher in urban schools, community based organizations, and institutions of higher education.

March 18 – March 21, 2013: Dominican College presented the fourth Annual Gender Awareness Forum. The Forum featured an array of special events including a film series on gender-related topics as well as several notable guest lecturers including “Women in Prison,” by Dr. Venezia Hannah Michalsen of Montclair State University and “Cell Block Visions: Prison Art in America,” by Phyllis Kornfield, international expert on the subject.

April 3, 2013: Caryl Stern Larosa, President and CEO of the U.S. Fund for UNICEF, delivered the second President’s Lecture. Her topic was “Living Leadership and Service.”

April 18, 2013: Co-sponsored by the Hudson Valley Chapter of NASW, and organized by Social Work Program Director, Dr. Paul DuongTran, the second annual Social Work Student Advocacy Research Conference featured a keynote address by graduating Social Work Program student Maureen Fitzpatrick, '13, and presentations by students from Dominican College and from several other area institutions, including CUNY and Mercy College.

March 19, 2013: Dominican College hosted the fourth Annual Honors Lyceum featuring international journalists and media experts, Adrian Dickson and his wife Adriana LaRotta, who delivered a presentation titled “Free Minds, Free Press in a Free World.”

May 2, 2013: Annual Nurse Leadership Day provided a forum for Nursing Program seniors to showcase their research projects. Nursing Program alumnus Miguel Alexis, '00, delivered a lecture entitled “Men in Nursing.”

April 26, 2013: At the annual Hudson Valley Undergraduate Psychology Conference several student researchers from Dominican College and from five other colleges and one high school delivered a total of 34 paper and poster presentations based upon their research.

May 1, 2013: Undergraduate students from Athletic Training, Biology, Honors, and Nursing Programs, in addition to undergraduate and graduate students in the B.S./M.S. program in Occupational Therapy, delivered on-campus public presentations of their original research projects.

June 7 – 9, 2013: Dominican College hosted the NYS Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) Student Leadership Conference. Undergraduate and graduate students as well as faculty from CEC chapters across NYS participated.

The College’s Humanities Council sponsored several special events throughout the academic year including: “An Evening of Poetry and Art with B.K. 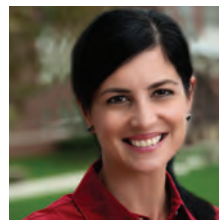

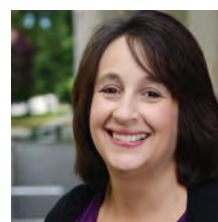
