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Graduates Graced by His Eminence

Timothy Cardinal Dolan
Delivers Commencement Address



There was a heightened excitement and anticipation leading up to Dominican College's 65th Commencement Exercises because His Eminence, Timothy Cardinal Dolan, was delivering the Commencement Address. The charismatic Cardinal Dolan received an honorary degree, Doctor of Humanities, during the ceremony on Sunday, May 19, 2019 at the Westchester County Center in White Plains, NY. "What an honor, what a joy, to receive this degree," he said.

The honor was bestowed upon Cardinal Dolan in recognition of a life dedicated to service of the poor, education of the mind, and care of the soul.

After receiving the honorary degree, Cardinal Dolan addressed the Class of 2019. "I sense a special bond with all of you, because I, too, relish the education I received from Dominicans—in my case, four years of theology at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome."

He added, "The intellectual wattage of the daughters and sons of St. Dominic is a most radiant jewel in the crown of Mother Church and western civilization."

Cardinal Dolan told the graduates that although Commencement speakers typically give words of wisdom and impart wise counsel, he was inspired by them. He called the graduates his "professors" and said they taught him five important lessons.

The first lesson he said he learned was the importance of education. "You chose school. You chose learning. You chose education. You chose college and I thank you for that. God's most profound natural gift to us is our mind," he said.

Cardinal Dolan said it was also clear that the graduates cherish community and that they appreciate tradition. In addition, he said they reminded him that life has purpose and meaning. Finally, said Cardinal Dolan, "You are letting us know, in a very jubilant

way, that all we get is intended to be given away. I watch you in admiration, chafing to get going, to put your learning to good use, to move on, to get to work.”

A total of 573 students graduated—105 with doctoral degrees, 64 with master’s degrees, 402 with bachelor’s degrees, and two with associate degrees.

President Sr. Mary Eileen O’Brien, O.P., Ph.D., told the graduates to receive their diplomas with a sense of pride in their accomplishment. “Be proud of your Alma Mater, as we are of you. Remember, once a Charger, always a Charger! Dominican College will ultimately measure its effectiveness, not by the degrees of its faculty or the size of its campus, although we treasure both, but rather by the competence and compassion, the vision and generosity of its over 15,000 graduates. How greatly the world needs your joyful and hope-filled lives,” she said.

In addition to Cardinal Dolan, several other individuals were honored during the Commencement Exercises.

- ◆ John E. Sorrentino, retired Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Pfizer in Pearl River, NY, received an honorary degree, Doctor of Science, in recognition of his outstanding work in the development of life-enhancing vaccines. He also led Pfizer’s corporate citizenship efforts and was helpful in upgrading the College’s biology and chemistry laboratories in Forkel Hall.
- ◆ Dr. Ronald Israelski, a hand/micro vascular surgeon, is currently Director of Medical Education at Orange Regional Medical Center and received the Veritas Medal. Dr. Israelski has done extensive relief and charity work in Haiti, working tirelessly to improve medical delivery to the people of Port-au-Prince. He has also improved medical services to the uninsured in Sullivan County and New York City.

Mentoring Through Chess

The recipient of the 2019 Badami Outstanding Young Alumnus Award, Abdul Sulaiman Jr., has devoted his life to mentoring and inspiring young people, especially underprivileged New York City youth. In 2013, Abdul founded a company called Project Pawn to mentor children through the game of chess. Using chess as a metaphor for life, Project Pawn teaches young people important life lessons about planning ahead, problem solving, having patience, learning how to win, and learning how to lose.

After all, Sulaiman knows all about overcoming hardships in life. He was born and raised in a violent, drug-ridden neighborhood in the Bronx, and was devastated when his father passed away before he attended Dominican College. Later, at the age 24, Abdul was robbed at gunpoint in Harlem and shot in the stomach. He miraculously made a full recovery, after receiving 26 staples in his stomach.

"I knew at that point I wanted to do something different," he said. "I knew that I was here for a reason. I wanted to make sure that my life was full of purpose."

Sulaiman decided to start a business teaching kids how to play chess. "As I went through that event, I thought about something I could do to teach people to think before they react—to think a few moves ahead before they make a decision that could cost them their life or someone else's life," he said. "Chess is something that definitely promotes that in various ways."

Over the past six years, Project Pawn has mentored 2,500 children in chess. Another 5,000 children have attended Project Pawn workshops. Ten elementary and middle schools in the Bronx, Manhattan, and Brooklyn currently have Project Pawn programs.



Sulaiman stresses that chess is a great way for kids who are not athletic to be part of a group and enjoy competition. He said chess evens the playing field because race, size, and strength don't matter. "It's all in the mind and it's a good way for everyone to compete," he said.

Children attend Project Pawn programs free of charge because Sulaiman contracts directly with the schools. In an effort to give back to the community, Sulaiman started the Project Pawn Foundation in 2015. The non-profit arm of Project Pawn has collected coats for kids, held a toy drive, and raised funds to feed the hungry.

Realizing that a business degree would be helpful in his new venture, Sulaiman earned an MBA from Mercy College in 2016. In addition to working as the CEO of Project Pawn, Sulaiman, who recently married, works full time as a physical education teacher at the Classical Charter School in the Bronx. He has also been an involved Dominican College alumnus and served on the Alumni Board.

Sulaiman's story began in the River Park Towers in the Bronx. He was an avid basketball player and participated in an elementary school chess club, which gave him the opportunity to travel all over the country. Abdul believes that playing chess helped him stay out of trouble while growing up in a rough

neighborhood. After losing his father, however, he was very angry and struggled as a new student at Dominican College. His grades suffered as he worked at night and often traveled home to help his mother. By junior year, Abdul decided to turn his life around and make both his mother and his father proud. He pulled up his grades, made the Chargers basketball team, became a peer mentor, and served as president of the Residence Life Association. In his senior year, he was awarded the prestigious Spirit of the Founders Award. Sulaiman graduated from Dominican College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in humanities in 2009.

At the Commencement Ceremony in May, Sulaiman was awarded the 2019 Badami Outstanding Young Alumnus Award in recognition of his hard work and perseverance to attain his goals, his dedication to mentoring and inspiring young people, and his commitment to giving back to the communities he serves.

"My heart is full of sincere gratitude," said Sulaiman. "To receive such an honor from an institution that became my family, gave me hope that I'm making the very people who believed in me proud."

Although he has many achievements, Sulaiman has much more he hopes to accomplish. He dreams of expanding Project Pawn programs to many more schools or building Project Pawn centers across the country to provide a safe place for children to learn, grow, and express themselves. ■

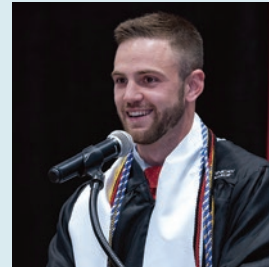

Criminal Justice Graduates Inducted into the Alumni Hall of Achievement

The Dominican College Criminal Justice Program celebrated its 10-year anniversary on Sunday, April 7, 2019 with the induction of three criminal justice graduates into the Alumni Hall of Achievement. The new inductees are: Jeremy Arcaro, '09, for Excellence; Michelle Soto, '11, for Leadership, and Katie McLaughlin, '16, for Service. JEREMY ARCARO, '09, FOR EXCELLENCE

Jeremy Arcaro was a lacrosse star at Dominican College, playing all four years and scoring the 3rd highest career goals (83) in the program's history—a record he still holds today. He describes himself as a “troublesome” student at Dominican College, but credits the College with setting him on the right path.

“Honestly, what this experience has done for me at Dominican College was not only make me a leader on the [lacrosse] field...but also in my current profession today,” he said.

For the past three years, Arcaro has worked as a police officer in the New Windsor, NY Police Department. He is an instructor at the Police Chief's Association of Orange County Police Academy and a field-training officer for new police officers. As a member of New Windsor's Community Policing Unit, he created and delivered a number of anti-bullying presentations at elementary and middle schools.

Arcaro has received three awards for saving a person's life. The most recent incident took place on June 10, 2017 when he performed life-saving CPR and first aid on a person who was unresponsive and not breathing.



In addition to his police duties, Arcaro is the owner/operator of Laxology and owns the New York Reign Lacrosse Club. Laxology runs lacrosse camps and hosts clinics for players in high school, as well as younger athletes. The aim of the program is to boost a player's lacrosse IQ and awareness in a friendly environment to allow the players to successfully compete at the highest levels of lacrosse.





MICHELLE SOTO, '11, FOR LEADERSHIP

Michele Soto is a management consultant and has worked for the U.S. Office of Personnel Management and the Department of Homeland Security. Since graduating from Dominican College, she received a Master of Arts in Criminology, Law and Society from George Mason University.

Soto founded a nonprofit organization called Letters of Hope (letterofhope.org) which provides handwritten letters of encouragement to individuals experiencing hardships, including residents of homeless shelters, prisoners, and military families. Soto says she has received wonderful feedback from the recipients of the letters.

The importance of giving to the community was a lesson Soto learned as a student at Dominican College. "When I first visited Dominican College, it was like a hidden gem. I knew as soon as I visited the College that I had to be part of this community that was so loving," she said.

Soto was fully involved in campus life at Dominican College. She was president of the Criminal Justice Club, president of the Debate Team, and president of the senior class. She also volunteered to go on Alternative Spring Break trips to the Dominican Republic and to Gulfport, MS to help rebuild after Hurricane Katrina.



Soto said Dominican College will always remain dear to her heart. She treasures her Dominican College education and says the criminal justice degree she received launched her career because she was able to secure a position as a background investigator as soon as she graduated.



KATIE MCLAUGHLIN, '16, FOR SERVICE

Katie McLaughlin is an enthusiastic ambassador for Dominican College, speaking at admissions events to prospective students about the opportunities she has had since graduation. She often discusses the confidence she gained as a student, which allowed her to thrive in law school and her career.

"Dominican College definitely gave me the courage and the strength to get through law school, the academic ability to make it and really push through all the hard parts—especially the bar," she said.

McLaughlin transferred to Dominican College and found the sense of community that had been missing at her previous school. She co-chaired the Relay for Life event, was a member of the Criminal Justice Club, and a member of four honor societies—Alpha Chi, Pi Gamma Mu, Alpha Phi Sigma, and Psi Chi. In addition, she served as an admissions student ambassador.



After graduation, McLaughlin attended Pace University Law School on a full scholarship. At Pace, she was a senior associate with the Pace Law Review, a Pace Criminal Justice Society member and a member of the Women's Association of Law Students. McLaughlin received her Juris Doctor in May 2018. She clerked for Essex County, NJ Judge James W. Donohue, after interning with the U.S. Attorney's Office, the Rockland County District Attorney's Office, and the Hillsdale Police Department. She recently started her dream job of working as a prosecutor. ■

Former Dominican College Golfer Brian Mackey Competes in 2019 PGA Championship

Brian Mackey, '08, a former Dominican College golf standout, competed among the top golfers in the world during the 2019 PGA Championship, held at Bethpage Black in Farmingdale, NY in May. During the opening two rounds of the tournament, the current head golf professional at Hollow Brook Golf Club in Cortlandt Manor, NY posted a seven-over-par 147.

Mackey was one of just 20 club pros from around the country to earn a spot in his first-ever PGA championship. The PGA

Championship brings together tour professionals and club professionals to compete for the association's national championship.

"To have qualified for a Major Championship was extremely validating and beyond exciting. It was such a great feeling to have my whole family be a part of something I have always dreamt of accomplishing and worked so hard for," said Mackey. "It's a massive team effort though; you don't get anywhere in this life without the help, love, and support of others."

Mackey said he was very grateful for the experience and super-motivated to do it again.

Mackey was named the 2018 New Jersey Player of the Year. He is one of the best golfers in CACC history, as he claimed the 2008 NCAA Division II East/Atlantic Super Regional Individual Championship by winning in a playoff. By claiming the title, Mackey then competed in the 2008 NCAA Division II National Championship Tournament. His incredible run happened under the guidance of his father and former Dominican

College men's golf coach, Wayne Mackey.

As for the future, Mackey said he will continue to pursue golf as a proud PGA professional. "My passion is to help people enjoy golf both individually and with their families. I will always strive to compete at the highest level. That will never change. I look forward to all the future challenges this beautiful game entails," he said.

Mackey was inducted into the Dominican College Athletic Hall of Fame in fall of 2019.

A Champion for Special Olympians

The Special Olympics have taken Nancy Hogan Logan around the world—as a coach, official, and competition director—for more than 35 years. Her passion for the Special Olympics began while she was a student at Dominican College, and she has volunteered in many different capacities ever since.

“I loved sports and I loved being part of a team and the excitement and the challenges. I think everybody deserves that—no matter your ability or your disability. It doesn’t make a difference,” she said.

Logan was a talented athlete, playing both basketball and softball during her four years at Dominican College. She even played on the men’s soccer team to stay conditioned. She is a member of the Sue Heller 1000 Point Club and the Dominican College Athletic Hall of Fame.



In the classroom, Logan pursued a career in special education. She chose that path after volunteering in high school at an afterschool program for children with Down syndrome. While at Dominican College, she worked at ARC, an organization for people with intellectual and physical disabilities, where she first became involved with the Special Olympics. Even after leaving that job, she continued to volunteer with the Special Olympics and her involvement has grown tremendously over the years.

"I love the challenge of somebody telling me that someone can't do something and now I'm going to find a way to make sure that they can," she said. "Everybody is capable of something. Everybody is good at something. It doesn't matter what their disability. For the athletes, they really shine in the Special Olympics."

There are about 700 athletes participating in the Special Olympics program in Rockland County from age 8 to 80. Logan coordinates leagues at the West Haverstraw Community Center. She has served as the training director for coaches and the competition director for floor hockey for the Hudson Valley Region and

New York State since 1993. She was selected as a floor hockey official for several Special Olympic World Games: 2001 in Alaska; 2005 in Japan; 2009 in Idaho; and 2013 in South Korea. She was also selected as director of competition for floor hockey for the 2017 World Games in Austria and the 2021 World Games in Sweden. Planning has already begun for Sweden's competition in two years. All the work is volunteer.

"Everyone still thinks of the Special Olympics as one track and field date at the end of the year," said Logan. "But it's really training people to be global messengers. People with special needs go out to the American Legion groups or go to other organizations to talk about the Special Olympics and how the Special Olympics has changed. It's as much about the athletic competition as it is about having everyone be independent."

Logan graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in English from Dominican College and a certification in special education. She later earned a master's degree in special education from the College of New Rochelle. Since 1987, she has worked at Nanuet High School. She teaches the Life Skills Class and serves as Coordinator of the Special Education Program, with 10 teachers and 17 assistants. She has been named Teacher of the Year or Special Educator of the Year nine times by various organizations.

"I like the challenge of it. I didn't want the same thing every day," she said. "I've been teaching 30 some odd years and I can tell you it's never boring," she said.

The Special Olympics are a labor of love for Logan and her husband. In fact, she first met her husband at the 2001 Special Olympic World Games in Alaska, where he was also volunteering.

"I love using my talents of organizing and knowledge of sports to help the athletes achieve their goals," said Logan. She has received numerous awards from the Special Olympics, including New York State Volunteer of the Year Award, Rockland County Volunteer of the Year Award, Dorothy Buehring Phillips Award (named for the Special Olympics founder), and the Training Director Award.

Logan hopes to spread a message about the Special Olympic athletes. "The message is that they are just like everybody else," she said. "They are in the community. They have jobs. They have families. They have boyfriends, girlfriends, husbands, wives. It doesn't matter that they have a disability. They still have the right and the ability to compete on a world level." ■

Q & A with Dr. Mark Meachem



Professor Studies Prevalence of Opinions on Cable News

During the spring semester, Dr. Mark Meachem was on sabbatical to examine primetime cable news reporting to determine if the amount of opinions being offered on the newscasts had increased over the past 11 years. Dr. Meachem is the Director of the Division of Arts & Sciences and an Associate Professor of Communications Studies. He presented his findings at the Eastern Communications Conference in Providence, RI in April and recently discussed the research and findings with us.

Q Why did you decide to study the frequency of opinions on cable news?

A I have a degree in journalism and have always been a news junkie. However, over the past four to five years, I began to really notice a dependence on opinion in the news I heard. I saw a real break from the traditional journalism guidelines that I learned. Then, in June 2018, the Pew Research Center published the results of a study it conducted to see how well Americans distinguished opinions from fact. The findings of this study were the impetus of this research. According to the study of over 5,000 U.S. adults, only about a quarter of Americans correctly identified all five factual statements. I began to wonder what makes it so hard for Americans to separate fact from opinion? And why is the news not offering facts with limited, clearly-defined opinion? Where did the rules of journalism dissolve? The search for an answer to these questions is what initiated my examination of news.

Campaign to Build **Turf Field and Track** *Underway*

Dominican College is planning to construct an NCAA regulation-size turf field, with a six-lane track surrounding the field, on the site of the current grass field near Forkel Hall. The project includes plans for permanent bleachers to seat 225 spectators, a press box, and a new scoreboard.

A fundraising campaign—called “dirt 2 turf”—aims to raise about \$3 million for the project, which will benefit Dominican College men’s and women’s soccer and lacrosse teams, as well as men’s and women’s cross-country, and track and field teams. It is hoped that construction will be completed sometime next year.

John Burke, V.P. for Student Development and Dean of Students, said that it is critical to complete the project as soon as possible because the soccer and lacrosse teams need somewhere to play and practice. “Our current soccer field is in disrepair. The last two years we’ve had to go off campus for a number of matches because our field was not playable,” he said.

Director of Athletics Joseph Clinton is among those leading the charge for a new turf field. “The athletes have told me that they want more students to be able to attend their games and that they want to play on campus. Right now that is not an option for

our men's and women's lacrosse teams," he said. "For our soccer teams, if we have bad weather the day or two before a game, we have to move the game to an off-campus turf field. For all of our outdoor sports, it will give them an option to practice outside in the winter months, instead of using the parking lot."

The men's soccer and lacrosse teams are coached by alumni who have seen the field deteriorate first-hand. Head Coach of Men's Soccer Colin Hodge, '08, said, "Back in 2005, when I was playing on the grass field, it was fine. We were very successful and it was easy to compete with other schools. But what we've noticed in the past five to seven years is that all these other schools have gotten better facilities for their soccer and lacrosse programs, and Dominican College hasn't." Hodge said the some teams have refused to play Dominican College on the current home field.

From Hodge's perspective, a new turf field can't come soon enough. "For me, it's a big deal. It will be easier to recruit kids. It will be easier to keep kids at the school once we have a turf field. We won't have to play home games off campus."

The soccer teams play some games at the World Class facility on Orangeburg Road. The lacrosse teams play their games at the Torne Valley field in Hillburn.

Interim Head Coach of Men's Lacrosse Daniel Steigert, '13, said playing off campus makes it difficult for students to come and watch the games. When he was a student, he remembers how he and his teammates loved playing on campus and drawing a crowd.

Steigert is hoping a new turf field will bring back that experience for his players. "Everyone loves playing in front

of their friends," said Steigert. "I would love nothing more than to get hundreds of students in the stands on a beautiful April day when it's in the 70s, after a harsh winter, and they are cheering because of school pride."

Although the Hennessy Center extension with a new state-of-the-art fitness center is impressive, some athletes are looking for more. "One recruit I had here, we brought him in the gym and showed him all the enhancements and he said, 'Coach, this is great, but we don't play lacrosse in a weight room,'" said Steigert.

Burke said the emphasis is now on raising the money needed for the field. "We are going to be very proactive to look for external funding opportunities, with the hope that we can start this project in 2020," he said.

Senior Advancement Officer Sal Pennino said the fundraising campaign officially began with the Turf Field Kickoff event on November 30, 2018 with former soccer and lacrosse athletes. "The campaign, which is named dirt 2 turf, will be reaching out to community members, corporations, foundations, and our alumni for support in raising the necessary funding to complete the project. Our hope is to have our alumni step forward and leave their legacy with a gift towards the construction of the turf field. Every gift matters, no matter how much, in order to bring a state-of-the-art field that will be used and enjoyed for generations to come," he said.

The new turf field will have a number of naming opportunities to recognize the commitment and generosity of our donors. For more information about these naming opportunities, the new turf field, and the dirt 2 turf campaign, visit dirt2turf.dc.edu. ■

Dominican College Launches Effort to Become a Tobacco-Free Campus

Dominican College has joined a national movement to address smoking and tobacco use at college campuses. The College will receive funds and technical support from Truth Initiative®, the nation's largest nonprofit public health organization dedicated to making tobacco use a thing of the past.

"Dominican College is committed to making our environment safer, healthier, and more productive," said Director of Student Health and Project Leader Lynda Chesterman. "Students, faculty, staff, and administrators will be asked to support the adoption of a 100 percent tobacco-free or smoke-free policy."

Co-leader Jenna Tacinelli Hach, Clinical Education Coordinator and Assistant Professor of Athletic Training, added, "Tobacco use remains the number one cause of preventable

death in this country. In addition, secondhand smoke exposure causes cancer and cardiopulmonary diseases."

Dominican College has formed a Taskforce for a Tobacco-Free Campus to assess tobacco use, identify a treatment plan for current smokers, and draft a smoke-free or tobacco-free policy. Two students on the task force will develop and lead educational efforts among students. The policy ultimately must be approved by the President's cabinet before being enacted.

Regional Leaders Participate in County Executive Forum

Bergen County Executive James Tedesco III, Westchester County Executive George Latimer, and Rockland County Executive Ed Day all participated in the County Executive Forum on June 11, 2019. The County Executives spoke with business leaders about infrastructure, transportation, and business development in the region. The annual event is sponsored by the Palisades Institute.



High School Students "RISE" to the Occasion During Summer Science Program

Dominican College hosted a three-week summer research experience for high school students in July. The free program is called RISE (Research Immersion in Science and Ecology) and was generously funded by Orange and Rockland Utilities.

Regina Alvarez, Biology Professor, said the 15 high school participants in the program were mature, intelligent, and highly motivated to learn. "Our aim was to expose the students to different STEM and environmental science fields and to nurture and promote their interest in science," she said.

During the first week of the RISE program, students were introduced to a range of

STEM fields and careers through various workshops. Students then worked with undergraduate mentors and a scientist, to complete a project during the second week. The projects focused on the Sparkill Creek and included chemical descriptions, microbiological and viral genomics, and botanical and ecological surveys. The program concluded with students learning how to analyze data and prepare a poster presentation. On July 26, 2019, the students presented their work at Dominican College to their families, friends, and teachers.

College Hosts Regional History Conference

Dominican College hosted the Phi Alpha Theta New York-New Jersey Regional Undergraduate History Conference on Saturday, April 27, 2019 in the Prusmack Center. Phi Alpha Theta is a national history honor society.

The conference attracted students from eight area colleges



and universities to present their papers. In addition to the three Dominican College presenters, there was also participation of students from Adelphi University, Georgian Court University, Marist College, Mercy College, SUNY-Albany, SUNY-New Paltz, SUNY-Plattsburgh, and West Point.

“An event like this is a great reminder that the liberal arts—and history in particular—are still very popular among students. It was truly gratifying to see so many students overflowing with passion to share their historical research and to listen to the research of other undergraduates,” said History Professor Christopher Libertini. “Dominican College proved to be an ideal venue to host such an event with its central location to so many area colleges and universities and its proximity to some of New York’s important historical sites dating back to colonial times.”

Students at the conference heard from keynote speaker Dr. Michael Decker, Executive Director of Phi Alpha Theta. Preceding the conference, there was a free walking tour of nearby Old Tappan. ■

Q What are some of the main findings of your research?

As a whole (all three cable news networks), 20.5 percent of all statements on their broadcasts were opinions during the time periods I examined—2008, 2013, 2018.

While FOX News led the pack in terms of overall opinion during the three years I examined, in 2018, CNN leaped ahead of all the networks, in terms of opinion. I found a statistically significant increase in opinions on CNN from 2013 to 2018. Nearly 26 percent of CNN’s statements were listed as opinion in 2018—a 61 percent increase from 2013.

Finally, I saw a significant use of the term “I think” on

all networks. This phrase is a major contributor to the confusion between fact and opinion. The variations on the “I think” phrase amounted to an average of 22 references per episode among all networks for the 11-year span. Given that most of these shows were approximately 44 minutes in length, excluding commercials, the phrase is being said every two minutes of a primetime cable news show.

Q Do you have any recommendations for viewers on how to differentiate between opinion and fact?

A I think viewers need to think of cable news as “talk shows” and not newscasts. You may like what people on *The View* say but you recognize it as opinion. When a network calls itself a “news network,” the expectation is often to receive news. If we think of Sean Hannity or Rachel Maddow as talk show hosts (like Ellen DeGeneres) and not news anchors, you take the first step toward differentiating fact from opinion. Other than that, I would suggest stepping back and using more print media. While it may seem “out of date,” it is easier to recognize opinion from fact when you see the words in print as compared to hearing them spoken.

Q What about cable news shows? Do you think they have a responsibility to their

viewers to present opinions and facts differently?

A Well, there is nothing inherently wrong with the concept of Opinion Journalism. Having the media offer opinion does help to provide understanding of various points of view and to provide counterpoints to common thinking. In addition, the promotion of well-developed opinion helps fuel democracy and discussion of alternative viewpoints. But the media needs to do much more to clearly separate the two for viewers. Newspapers have always done this with a specific editorial page and a dedicated Op-Ed page. In the past, network news would also have anchors offer a commentary at the end of a broadcast. The difference was the anchor delivered the remarks with clear writing at the bottom of the screen indicating this was commentary.

One other concern I have with these news outlets heavy use of opinion is that it devalues actual reporting. Talk is, literally, cheap. This is where the “value” of opinion has changed the definition of news. Having four panelists sit and discuss their ideas of a foreign crisis is far less expensive than having foreign offices, or hiring a reporter and crew to be on the scene in the Middle East or Asia to collect and report facts. ■
